Hearts of Gratitude



Colossians 3:16 (NIV) Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts.

Gratitude takes on a whole new meaning after spending time at Cornerstone in preparation for Thanksgiving at the mission. This year we had more than 200 calls from people either wanting to donate food, money or time to help with Thanksgiving. We are so blessed to be in a community of giving individuals and groups who donate food (like 70 pies), or table decorations with fresh flowers, or people dropping off checks to help pay for the food, and the food donations themselves.

We planned for 300 people and had slightly less, but what we did have was full hearts of gratitude for the way the community came alongside us with everything needed for a very blessed holiday. The blessings continue as a high school youth group held a fundraiser collecting money from the congregation for four weeks, raising \$623 and purchasing and delivering 180 dozen eggs, several pounds of coffee, 15 gallons of cooking oil and several containers of powdered drink mixes, with the help of a grocer who belongs to that church. Several retailers collected coats for the coat drive, and the C-Me Ministry continues to grow. C-Me stands for Coffee, Milk and Eggs. Each day the

Cornerstone Rescue Mission and its ancillary facilities uses 10 pounds of coffee, 10 gallons of milk, and 12 dozen eggs. We provided over 149,000 meals last year, and we are eternally grateful to the people who volunteer to bring and cook meals, make monetary and food donations, and help out on a daily basis.

Families from Cornerstone Apartments were blessed with Thanksgiving meal baskets and holiday gifts. Families have been appreciative and have been sponsored for the holidays and beyond. Community residents from several local churches and other volunteers extended their generosity to the Cornerstone families through these donations. Folks from Ellsworth Air Force Base and employees of other Retailers and Restaurants have contributed tovs for all the children this Christmas. The Cornerstone Christmas Store once again gave out gift certificates for every guest no matter the age for shopping at the Thrift Store. Santa was on hand for photos with the children, and another church group served homemade Christmas cookies and hot apple cider. The Christmas meal was prepared and served thru donations and volunteers, with special desserts for all.

How do you ever find a way to say thank you to so many people for making such a difference in the lives of our community's homeless men, women and children? We do definitely have an extra dose of appreciation and an attitude of gratitude!

A New Start for Ruby

"Ruby" came to stay at Cornerstone Women and Children's Home in early June last year. She had been staying with her daughter who had kicked her out. Even though she received a monthly SSI check, she didn't have any place to stay.

Ruby, a joyful lady in her 50s, was a pleasure to be around, but there were several things she would need assistance with to help improve her quality of life and secure housing. She was mentally challenged but had graduated from high school. Since Ruby didn't receive special education in high school, she wasn't eligible for housing offered by Black Hills Workshop. She would need to undergo testing to determine if she would be an appropriate referral for their program. Without transportation and an advocate it was likely that her ongoing needs couldn't be met, and that she would continue to fall through the cracks.

Ruby was functionally illiterate, she could read and write just enough to get by, and so her case manager helped her get an appointment with the Literacy Network so she improves her reading and writing skills. As she went to her appointments, Ruby's confidence continued to grow. Ruby, her case manager at the Home, and her counselor worked together to set up an appointment with Vocational Rehab to begin

the process so she could get the testing needed to determine if she was eligible to be referred to the Workshop.

Ruby also suffered from chronic back pain. Her case manager from the Home worked with her doctor to get her a referral to a specialist. In early September Ruby left the Home to undergo back surgery, drastically reducing her chronic pain.

After getting out of rehab, Ruby returned to the Home. She continued to work with her case manager to get her remaining needs met. After much persistence, her test results were compiled and she was accepted to move into an apartment where an advocate from the Workshop will see that all of her ongoing needs are met. She recently met her new roommate and the staff person from the Workshop who she'll work with. Her eyes just beamed when she returned from her visit.

Ruby can't wait to move to her new apartment. She will be settled in time to enjoy the New Year. Ruby will continue to work with Literacy Network to improve her reading and writing skills. All of us at the Women and Children's Home are happy for Ruby and relieved to know that her future needs will continue to be met.
