the right choice, and after a tour and spending some time there, they both decided it was right. The happy children's laughter and the big back yard helped them make that decision. Anne's first day was a little hard, but soon she was playing and enjoying herself along with the rest of the children. The staff began to notice that every day Anne was more willing to participate in activities and no longer hung back afraid to join in.

While staff was excited to see the changes in Anne, it was Susan, her mother's changes that were even more noticeable. She had always appeared to be a very attentive mom, but it was her care of Anne and herself that really

began to change. As she neared the end of her time at the treatment facility, she began looking for employment. Every time she shared a milestone or a successful outcome with staff, they had a mini celebration with her, congratulating her on her consistency and hard work. She was

smiling brightly on the day of graduation, announcing that she had also found housing for her and Anne. Isn't it amazing how just a little encouragement can make such a difference in someone's life? She works everyday to better herself and to make a better life for her and her daughter. Anne is still enrolled in Dear Ones Child Care and still making her own little improvements. She is caring for the younger ones, helping them with coloring, crafts and food at meal times. Both mother and daughter are finding that new life is possible with change. They do LOVE Rapid City

Summertime blessings flow through the love of volunteers. We are so blessed to have many people volunteer at the various locations, such as helping with childcare, special projects, and processing donations at the Thrift Store. Once again, volunteer groups gathered for their city wide volunteer efforts called "Love Rapid City". The Groups are made up of people from two area churches - Fountain Springs Community Church and Crossroads Wesleyan. Combined they were able to provide 593 individual volunteers who went out into the community working at 22 nonprofit organizations. A total of 2,543 serving hours were logged in just one week. We are so grateful to them for all the work they did for Cornerstone Rescue Mission.

Another summer volunteer group is Youth Works, a nonprofit organization of junior high and high school students serving Christ through community service work. Trained Service Coordinators lead the kids on mission trips to 78 sites around the country. Youth Works leaders welcome a new group of 40 to 60 students to the Rapid City site each week from early June to early August. Nationwide, some 39,000 students are expected to participate during the course of this summer. Their help and work at the Thrift Store has been incredible, and we don't know what we would do without the help of the volunteers who Love Rapid City and Cornerstone Rescue Mission.
