A Story of Redemption

We recently had a Marine Veteran as a guest at the mission who was willing to share the very interesting, difficult story of his life. For the purposes of this article we'll call him David. He had a rough start as a young child enduring abuse by a family member, and isolated himself from others because of it. At the age of 10 he started boxing and it became more than hobby when he started boxing professionally. He was blackballed when

he refused to take a dive in a match, so he began boxing for private parties. David chuckled as he added I fought until I was 45 years old one way or another.

Addiction had been a prevalent part of his life, starting with alcohol at the age of 13 and marijuana at the age of 17. He rode with the Hells Angels motorcycle gang after meeting one of their members and building his own motorcycle. He had begun to study scripture and was inspired but it didn't last -- David had trouble with the law and in court one day his dad suggested joining the Marine Corp. and the judge quickly agreed.



During these years David had periods of sobriety. He mentioned the scripture in Matthew of the sower and likened himself to the seed who grew up quick and had no root & withered. He began, once again, to study scripture but the lust of the world kept him coming back to the addictions. He had a three year period of sobriety and during that time he got accepted into the Baptist Seminary. An old Baptist preacher told him that it was outlaws like him that sometimes make the best pastors because of their experiences. Especially in jail house ministries because they are so relatable. As David looks back now he sees how God was with him in every situation.

After a few failed marriages he met a Madame and felt that world pull him into drugs and bigger trouble. He was in and out of jails, a total of 17 county jails in 3 different states. He finally ended up in prison but believes it was a blessing, quoting Psalm 119:71 It was good for me to be afflicted so that I might learn your decrees. NIV He says God took him out of everything and allowed him the prison time to read the bible and truly study scripture. As he said "I did not have anything else to do." David had gotten involved in jail house ministries because of his prison time, laughingly commenting he did it by coming in the back door. He says he thoroughly enjoys the jail ministry. He now prays with anyone of the guests at the mission who wants prayer. David listens as they talk, he can relate with many of their circumstances and they can tell he really understands and cares in a nonjudgmental way. He wants to serve the Lord and says "I'm just like them - I am the least of these, and I wish someone had done that with me."

Now days he gets up early to read and meditate on scripture. He enjoys God's creation and to work outside, having done concrete work and ranch work in the area. David finished his story by stating one of his favorite verses -- John 3:17 For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. NIV He feels that verse is just as important as the verse that precedes it.
